



Access to Health Information

A global review of progress, lessons learned and ways forward

Providing access to reliable health information for health workers in developing countries is potentially the single most cost-effective and achievable strategy for sustainable improvement in health care.

Equitable and universal access to healthcare and health research information is recognised in the recent draft 'World Report on Knowledge for Better Health' as an important part of worldwide strategies to reduce global disparities in health and achieve the health-related Millennium Development Goals.

The report argues that 'access to relevant, reliable and up-to-date health and health research information [in] the developing world must be improved and must take into account the needs of diverse groups of constituencies and stakeholders'.

Involving the wider community in a global review of health information access is one of the key recommendations of a recent position paper commissioned by WHO: 'Improving access to information in developing countries' (Fiona Godlee *et al*, April 2004) This paper calls for a multi-agency initiative to ensure **universal access to health information by 2015**, and emphasizes that achievement of this goal will depend critically on the ability of all stakeholders to work together towards a shared vision. A short version is being published in *The Lancet* in July 2004.

Drawing from these and similar experiences, INASP and other organisations have joined forces in a review of what has been achieved in health information access and provision, what works and what doesn't.

The review will draw on past experience and current perspectives as a basis for future action. It will be comprehensive and inclusive, using discussion, feedback and ideas from providers and users of information worldwide. The review will mobilise, engage and galvanise key stakeholder groups in the health information field, with a view to reviewing and synthesising lessons learned and developing a shared agenda for the future.

Who is involved?

Participating agencies currently include: Association for Health Information and Libraries in Africa, BIREME (Latin American and Caribbean Centre on Health Sciences Information), *BMJ*, The Cochrane Collaboration, Exchange, Forum for African Medical Editors, Global Forum for Health Research, Interactive Health Network, International e-Health Association, *The Lancet*, Society for the Internet in Medicine, South Asian Public Health Forum, University of Papua New Guinea, Wellcome Trust, World Health Organization, and the WHO Eastern Mediterranean Regional Office. The review is facilitated by INASP.

The review will be formally launched at the British Medical Association, London, 12 July 2004
